# 2. Mayor's Comments

#### 5. Presentations

5.1 <u>Kennebecasis Regional Joint Board of Police Commissioners' Orientation – Chair</u> Bob McLaughlin and Chief Wayne Gallant, In Attendance

Chief Gallant provided Council with an overview of the operations of the Kennebecasis Regional Police Force, noting the following:

- 39 Uniformed Officers; 6 Civilian Staff; 4 Part-time Support Employees; 7 Auxiliary Officers; and 1 Police Chaplain;
- 17 Police Vehicles, 2 ATVs and 1 Motorcycle;
- Total 2021 Budget \$7,065,990; Total 2021 Salary Budget \$5,640,255;
- Percentage of Municipal Budgets Allocated to Police Services Quispamsis, 15.5% (2020); Rothesay, 17.6%, (2020);
- On average, 10,000 calls for service per year, with approximately 2,500 investigative files from those calls;
- Top calls for service include
  - Driving/Traffic Complaints;
  - Suspicious Activity;
  - Criminal Code Investigations; and
  - o Mental Health Calls
- The KRPF is governed by the Kennebecasis Regional Joint Board of Police Commissioners, which is funded by the two towns of Quispamsis and Rothesay, but operates as a separate entity. The Board consists of 4 members from each Town (2 elected), and 1 Provincial Government appointment.
- Highest rated strategic risks, ranked in order at present are:
  - Number of Police Resources;
  - o Building Space;
  - Technology Change & Challenges;
  - o Major Event Crisis;
  - Cyber Data Breach;

  - Fire Chief; Deputy Chief; Division Chief (2); Ex. Asst. (Part-time);
     Finance Clerk (Part-time); and 32 Full-time Fire Fighters & 8 Part-time Fire Fighters;
- Operating Budget \$5,624,058 (2021); Capital Budget \$333,000;
- Total Value of Capital Assets (2020) \$7,654,420;
- Collective Agreement expired December 2020 Average wage increase for firefighters 2.25% per year;
- Strategic Plan completed in 2020;
- Station 2 Renovation 2021 Capital budget includes Architectural Services of \$205,000; 2022 Capital Request to Complete Station 2 Renovation will be \$3,000,000;

- All participants will receive an Accelerator Plan, Planning Workshops, Economic Impact Analysis, Navigation Services, and Webinar Series.

#### 6. Correspondence

6.1 Richard Burrell - Correspondence Concerning Council Compensation - Mr. Burrell, In Attendance to Expand Upon Letter

Mr. Burrell made presentation to Council proposing a transparent method of determining future raises for Council that are reflective of the citizens and taxpayers of the Town, eliminating outside consultants and Council's input or approval, once the initial plan is implemented.

Councillor Miller noted the previous Council implemented the remuneration increase to become effective for the new Council, which was done transparently,

acknowledging that while salaries were increased, the allowance component of the Council remuneration was significantly reduced.

6.2 Mr. Derrick May - Request to Use Meenan's Cove Park Boat Launch - Tuesday,
August 24, 2021 for John Wood Foundation Fund Raising Event - Jet Ski
Rentals One Day Event to Rent Out Jet Skis (5)

Mr. May was in attendance and expanded upon his request to help raise funds for the John Wood Foundation to assist those living with physical disabilities. Mr. May has been walking 500 miles around Summerville, NB to raise awareness of the Foundation. He is asking Council for permission to use the Meenan's Cove Park boat launch on Tuesday, August 24, 2021 to permit Thrill Seekers Jet Ski Rentals to conduct a one day event making available 5 Jet Skis to rent out hourly with half the proceeds going to the John Wood Foundation. He noted it would cause a minor disruption in the use of the boat launch to the general public, Thrill Seekers Jets Ski Rentals will assume liability for the event and has \$2,000,000 in liability insurance.

The Community Services Director stated if it is the will of Council to permit the request, the applicant would be required to sign a Facilities Rental agreement and to also name the Town on their liability insurance policy.

6.3 <u>Sarah McCord, KVHS Art Teacher and Avery Milligan, KVHS Art Student, In Attendance - Proposed Mini Little Art Galleries Collaboration Project with KVHS</u>

Ms. McCord and Ms. Milligan expanded upon their proposal to create a 'tiny art gallery' in various locations around Quispamsis to create a space for people of all ages to put their art out there, and exchange it for other creations. The exchange involves all members of the community who wish to participate, while giving Grade 10 students at KVHS a sense of ownership and path to connect with their community and make a difference through Art. There will be no costs to the Town, with the shop class building the boxes to display the art, and hopefully the school obtaining educational grants. They are looking for four spaces for the installation of the boxes, possibly the Arts & Culture Park, qplex, Ritchie Lake, Meenan's Cove Park and/or the Gondola Point Ferry Landing.

#### 9. Unfinished Business

9.1 (May 4/21) Update on 48 Pettingill Road Re Online Plant & Garden Store and Apiary Operation - Staff Report from Municipal Planning Officer

A Staff Report from the Municipal Planning Officer informed Council on August 11, 2021 a Cease and Desist Order was served on the property owner prohibiting any further business activities on the property, requiring the removal of all displays associated with the Plant & Garden business activities and to advise the property owner to submit a formal request to the Town for consideration by Council or the PAC if their desire was to amend the property to permit business activities.

In addition, the Municipal Planning Officer advised Council he has discussed beekeeping activities with the Provincial Apiary Inspector, Fletcher Colpitts, who is familiar with the beekeeping at 48 Pettingill Road. Mr. Colpitts advised that based on inspections of the property, the beekeeping activity appears to be following provincial requirements — mainly health of the bees, the hives and disease prevention. Compliance with the land use by-law requirements would be under municipal jurisdiction.

Correspondence Update from Jocelyn Smith – Ms. Smith's correspondence indicated the spring flush is by far the worse time of year that they experience the issues with the bee poop, but that it still persists throughout the summer season. They also expressed their concerns about the garden centre, with respect to the traffic hazard it presents at the Pettingill Road property, noting the graded curve at this location.

A letter from the owners of 48 Pettingill Road, Shawn Mallet, written to the Municipal Planning Officer in response to the Cease & Desist Order, stated their growing of plants and connecting with members of the community is a hobby, and their plants set out on a cart are self-served and sold on the Honor system, as most days he and his partner are at work. This past year, Mr. Mallet stated, the hobby grew to a size that is well beyond what they would like or had imagined. They are trying to sell off the plants which they had grown this year, and have no plans of an operation this size in future, and are unsure of their future plans for this hobby.

10.4 <u>Deputy Mayor Mary Schryer - Proposed Scenic Road Designation - Gondola Point Road, Cedar Grove Drive, and Model Farm Road</u>

Deputy Mayor Schryer expanded upon her proposal to have the Gondola Point Road, Cedar Grove Drive and Model Farm Road designated as Scenic Roads in

the Town's upcoming Master Transportation Plan to provide plans for upgrades that enhance and maintain the rich history of these roads. She noted, as shared by the Honourable Graydon Nicholas at the July 20, 2021 meeting, the Mi'kmaq translation for 'Kennebecasis' is 'little long bay place', and 'Quispamsis' the Wolastoquiyik/Maliseet Tribe word meaning, 'little lake' referring to present day Ritchie Lake.

10.6 <u>Minister Daniel Allain - Local Government and Local Governance Reform</u>

<u>Announcement Re Canada Community-Building Fund 2020 - 21 Top Up Allocation</u>

and Program Changes - (\$1,274,469) (Formerly Gas Tax Fund)

Minister Allain's letter informed Council effective June 29, 2021; the program known as the Gas Tax Fund has been renamed the Canada Community-Building Fund to better reflect the evolution of the program. Fire halls and fire station infrastructure are now eligible investments under the new fund. In addition, under the Canada Community-Building Fund a one time 2020-21 top up allocation of \$1,274,469 is earmarked for the Town of Quispamsis.

Minister Allain be thanked for his correspondence indicating Quispamsis will receive a one time 2020-21 top-up allocation of \$1,274,469 under the Canada Community-Building Fund, (formerly called the Gas Tax Fund), and the additional funding amount be referred to Staff to review and prioritize the Town's infrastructure and/or capacity building projects and bring back recommendations to Council in September as to resubmitting a revised 2019-2023 Capital Investment Plan which includes the top up allocation, as required in order to access the additional funding.

# 10.7 <u>Councillor Kerrie Luck - Proposed Q-Map Suggestion to Promote Recreational</u> Facilities/Infrastructure and Local Businesses

Correspondence from Councillor Luck requested a Council discussion on how the Town can improve/build awareness of all its great offerings as well as how to make them easier to find, noting she had difficulty finding the Hammond River Park trail recently. She suggested the Town create a modified Q-map, showing main streets for context and the Town's recreational facilities and infrastructure could be made available both electronically and in hard copies. This, she noted, may also be an opportunity to involve local businesses in the area. She proposed additional signage be installed to improve locating trails/parks, ex. at Reynar Drive directing people to the Hammond River Park.

# 10.8 <u>Councillor Noah Donovan - Request for Update on Sidewalks - Quispamsis Road</u> Hill

Councillor Donovan's letter related he has been receiving requests from residents as to why sidewalks do not continue on the Quispamsis Road, noting it leads into Woodleigh Park off Cambridge Avenue, a large subdivision that have many families with children, especially given its close proximity to the gplex.

Councillor Donovan referenced the Director of Engineering & Works' Staff Report dated July 7, 2021 which noted during the 2019 budget consideration, staff had proposed the continuation of sidewalk along the Quispamsis Road as an extension of the sidewalk from the Pettingill Road towards eventually the qplex. However, the project at the time was approximately \$400m and the sidewalk portion was another \$190,000. Council, at that time, decided to opt for a widened shoulder, that could be added for \$20,000 and the area could be plowed with main road snowplows winging off the surface.

## 11. By-laws

11.1 Proposed Sign By-law Amendment No. 036-04; A By-law of the Municipality of Quispamsis Respecting Signs

A Staff Report from Jennifer Jarvis, Planning Technologist, informed Council the Town has received a request from Leisure Time Sales to amend the Sign By-law to allow the erection of a second freestanding sign as a third party sign at 8 Leisure Drive (PID 250886). The sign would advertise for both the Kennebecasis Rentals Outdoor Equipment Store and Leisure Time. Both businesses, she stated, are owned and operated by the Dobson Group of Companies. The current Sign By-law prohibits third party signs within the Town, thus the reason why the By-law would need to be amended to permit this use at this location as a notwithstanding clause.

11.2 <u>Proposed Traffic By-law Amendment No. 027-34 - (Section for No U-Turns); A By-law of the Municipality of Quispamsis Respecting Traffic</u>

The Director of Engineering & Works expanded upon his Staff Report noting to ensure proper enforcement of posted traffic control signage, the Traffic By-law No. 027 must include specific schedules. In this instance, Staff are proposing an amendment to the Traffic By-law to create a new Schedule "K" to list "No U-Turn"

areas. In addition, Staff are further recommending one area, Old Coach Road, near its intersection with the Hampton Road, be identified as one of the "No U-Turn" areas. Mr. Losier noted complaints have been received about traffic dropping off students at QES, then turning right onto Hampton Road, and then turning left onto the nearby Old Coach Road and doing U-turns as a short cut to get back on the Hampton Road. Some motorists are turning on private property and are creating safety risks for those pedestrians walking to school in that area.
